

# Glendale City Health Education: *National Heart Month:* **Hypertension, Part 2**

High blood pressure (HBP) – hypertension (HPTN) is sometimes called "the silent killer." The reason is: HBP usually has no symptoms, but can be damaging the arteries throughout the body. Thus, HBP affects the heart, kidneys, and other organs. Consider:

- ♦ 77% of Americans treated for a first stroke, 69% who have a first heart attack, and 75% with congestive heart failure have a blood pressure over 140/90.<sup>1</sup>
- ♦ HBP is the second leading cause of kidney failure.¹
- ♦ The risk of cardiovascular disease (CVD) beginning at 115/75 mmHg doubles with each systolic increment of 20 mmHg, and with each diastolic increment of 10 mmHg.<sup>2</sup>
- ♦ In persons older than 50 years, systolic blood pressure greater than 140 mmHg is a much more important CVD risk factor than diastolic blood pressure. <sup>2</sup>
- ♦ Raised systolic blood pressure in midlife increases the risk of dementia in late-life.<sup>3</sup>
- ♦ Persons with hypertension may be 1.5 times more likely to have macular degeneration (eye disease) than persons without hypertension.<sup>4</sup>

Hypertension is described as either primary (essential) or secondary. Only 5-10% of the cases are considered secondary, for which a cause is known. Known causes include: sleep apnea; kidney, thyroid, parathyroid, and other diseases; and drugs/supplements such as steroids, oral contraceptives, decongestants, non-steroidal anti-inflammatories (NSAIDs), licorice and ma haung. The majority of cases (90-95%) are referred to as "primary" because no cause can be found. However, there are known risk factors:

- ♦ Family history of HBP in parents or close blood relatives.
- ♦ Aging and gender: under age 45 more men than women have HBP. From 45-64 the risk is equal for men and women, but after age 64, the risk is much higher for women.
- ♦ Lack of physical activity.
- ♦ Poor diet, including too much salt, and lack of foods rich in calcium and potassium.
- ♦ Overweight (Body Mass Index BMI between 25 and 30) and obesity (BMI >30).
- ♦ Heavy and regular use of alcohol.
- ♦ Stress (contributing factor).
- ♦ Smoking and second-hand smoke (contributing factor).

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Knowing your numbers can lengthen your life!<sup>1</sup> Blood pressure should be checked annually beginning over age 3, and more o en if at risk, prehypertensive, or hypertensive. For more information, contact Dr. Kathy McFarland.
